WELCOME TO MELBOURNE

Melbourne is an arty powerhouse with a vibrant and multicultural soul. Nicknamed 'Paris of the southern hemisphere' Melbourne is not only known to be Australia's cultural hot-spot but is also famous for its major sport events and its culinary delights from all across the world. With it's high rising city centre and its far stretching suburbs, it is hard not to be dragged in by the life of the capital of Victoria – 'the place to be' – but daytrips to the wild nature of the state are also extremely attractive.

THE CITY

Melbourne is the second-largest city in Australia and is known to be Australia's most cultured city - although some Sydney-siders would contest this. The city's main features are museums, galleries and theatres, large green areas and the Yarra River flowing across the urban centre. Melbourne has seen wave after wave of immigrants, with Italians, Greeks, Chinese and Vietnamese all adding ingredients to the cultural and culinary mix. And there's the sportsmad of course. Each year Melbourne lays host to some of the world's major international sports events such as the Australian Open in tennis and the Formula 1.

The city developed during the height of the Victorian gold rush in the late 1800s, which is shown in the Victorianera architecture in some neighbour hoods. However, developments over the years have also left their mark, recently with the new and modern Federation Square complex and the Docklands re-development. But probably the most famous characteristic of Melbourne is the television series 'Neighbours' recorded here and broadcasted across the world for more than 20 years. If you fancy a trip out of the city, Melbourne is



also a great base for 1-2 day tours to, for example, the Grampians national Park, the Great Ocean Road with the Twelve Apostles, local wineries, and to observe the masses of penguins on Phillip Island coming home from the day at sea. Enjoy your stay in what many claim is the hippest city in the southern hemisphere.

DO & SEE

It is not without reason that Melbourne is often dubbed the world's most liveable city as the vibrant metropolis has plenty of attractions to visit and landmarks to see. Here are some of the main attractions that will show you the parts of Melbourne, which the city is so famous for.

Melbourne's ethnic diversity is reflected in its culinary world and as gastronomic outings are a bit of a local obsession, there are a vast variety of restaurants to choose from. Trains cover the city centre and suburban areas with Flinders Street Station as the main hub and run from 05.00-00.00. Trams cover the city and inner suburbs and run every 6-8 minutes but less frequently on late nights and weekends. Busses cover the whole city and suburbia. A Metcard can be used on all services and can be bought in stations, in shops carrying the Met flag or online: www.metcard.com.au/store/ A daily Metcard costs between A\$6.10-12.60 depending on the zones.
